2018 Freshman Cohort Non-returning Students: What do we know?

Executive Summary

The following report provides an analysis of 489 first-time full-time degree-seeking freshmen in the University of South Alabama (USA) 2018 freshman cohort who did not return to USA in Fall 2019. Of these non-returning students, 199 (41%) transferred to another institution prior to Fall 2019 and 290 (59%) “stopped out” or did not enroll in another college or university.

Results indicated a large majority of transfer students transferred to another public institution located in Alabama. Initial indicators known prior to Fall 2018 to monitor in order to identify students at greater risk to “stop out” instead of transferring to another institution local students from Mobile or Baldwin County (28%), lived off campus (21%), received an ACT Composite score of 20 or 21 (12%), received a Pell Grant (11%), and obtained a high school GPA of 3.0 or lower (10%). End of Summer 2019 findings showed a large percentage based differential between students who “stopped out” with a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower (45%) or students with zero to six hours earned at USA (23%) and students who transferred and had a similar USA GPA or a similar number of USA hours earned.

Overview

The following report provides an analysis of 489 first-time full-time degree-seeking freshmen in the University of South Alabama (USA) 2018 freshman cohort who did not return to USA in Fall 2019. The National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) was used to identify whether non-returning students transferred to another institution or “stopped out” and did not enroll in another higher education institution in Fall 2019. While the preference is for students to return and persist at USA, a student who transferred to another institution could be considered a secondary measure of student success.

More than 3,600 colleges and universities in the United States participate in the NSC. With NSC participating institutions enrolling over 99% of all students in public and private colleges and universities in the United States, students who were not identified as transfer students by the NSC were unlikely to be enrolled at another college or university and had “stopped out” of higher education. This report provides comparisons between 199 non-returning students who transferred to another institution prior to Fall 2019 and 290 non-returning students who “stopped out” and did not enroll at another college or university.

Profile of Non-returning Student Who “Stopped Out”

A non-returning student who “stopped out” most likely had the following profile or characteristics:

- Did not participate in Greek life (96%),
- Did not receive a NACAC fee waiver for ACT or SAT test-taking purposes due to meeting one of the indicators of economic need (89%),
- Did not attend a USA Day (87%),

- 18 years old (81%),
- Took a First Year Experience (FYE) course (77%),
- USA GPA of 2.0 or lower at the end of Summer 2019 (75%),
- Participated in a learning community (70%),
- White (63%),
- No freshman scholarship (61%),
- Not a first generation student (59%),
- Received a Subsidized Stafford Loan (58%),
- On probation after Fall 2018 (56%),
- Received a Pell Grant (55%),
- From Mobile or Baldwin County (52%),
- No other scholarship¹ (52%),
- Male (51%),
- Lived off-campus (51%),
- High school GPA of either 3.01-3.5 (43%),
- Earned zero to six USA credit hours at the end of Summer 2019 (31%),
- ACT Composite score of 20 or 21 (26%),
- Received one at-risk midterm grade in Fall 2018 (23%), and
- Attended Freshman Session 9 orientation (15%).

Profile of Non-returning Student Who Transferred

A non-returning student who transferred to another institution most likely had the following profile or characteristics:

- Did not participate in Greek life (94%),
- Did not receive a NACAC fee waiver for ACT or SAT test-taking purposes due to meeting one of the indicators of economic need (93%),
- 18 years old (91%),
- Did not attend a USA Day (81%),
- Not on probation after Fall 2018 (76%),
- Participated in a learning community (75%),
- Took a First Year Experience (FYE) course (72%),
- Lived on-campus (70%),
- Not a first generation student (66%),
- White (63%),
- Female (58%),
- No freshman scholarship (58%),
- Did not receive a Pell Grant (56%),
- High school GPA of 3.51 or higher (52%),
- Received a Subsidized Stafford Loan (52%),
- Received other scholarship (52%),
- From rest of Alabama (46%),
- No at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2018 (40%),
- USA GPA of 2.0 or lower at the end of Summer 2019 (30%),
- Earned 24.5-30 USA credit hours at the end of Summer 2019 (26%),
- ACT Composite score of 19 or lower (22%), and
- Attended Freshman Session 7 orientation (13%).

Where Non-returning Students Transferred

Of the 199 non-returning students who transferred, a large majority transferred to an institution with one of the following characteristics (see Table 1 and Table 2). The transfer institution was likely public (95%) and/or located in Alabama (64%). Florida (13%) and Mississippi (11%) were the next most likely state locations of the transfer institution for non-returning students. Non-returning students were also slightly more likely to attend a four-year (52%) institution.

The most common four-year university transfer institutions of choice (see Table 3) were Troy University (11) and University of Alabama at Birmingham (11). Of the two-year institutions, Coastal Alabama Community College (21), Bishop State Community College (10), and Calhoun Community College (10) were the most common transfer destinations.

Comparison of Non-returning Transfer Students to Students Who “Stopped Out”

Multiple characteristics of non-returning students were compared to determine what characteristics showed a large percentage based differential between 290 non-returning students who “stopped out” compared to 199 non-returning students who transferred. The following table displays characteristics with a percentage based differential of 10% or greater between students who transferred and students who “stopped out” (see Table 4 or complete data tables found in the Appendix).

Results showed the USA GPA after the end of Summer 2019 and the probation status of the student after Fall 2018 were the top two characteristics with subgroups that showed the greatest differential between non-returning students who “stopped out” and students who transferred. Results showed:

- 75% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” had a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower (206) compared to 30% of non-returning students who transferred (59), 23% of the non-returning students who transferred had a USA GPA of 2.51 to 3.0 (44) compared to 9% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (26), 20% of the non-returning students who transferred had a USA GPA of 3.01 to 3.5 (39) compared to 5% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (14), and 19% of the non-returning students who transferred had a USA GPA of 3.51 to 4.0 (37) compared to 3% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” (7) and
- 56% of non-returning students who “stopped out” were placed on probation after the Fall 2018 semester (163) compared to 24% of non-returning students who transferred (48).

Eight additional characteristics showed a percentage based differential greater than or equal to 10% between students who “stopped out” and students who transferred. The additional characteristics were: 1) number of USA hours earned after the end of Summer 2019, 2) region

where the student originated from, 3) housing (on/off campus), 4) number of at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2018, 5) high school GPA, 6) ACT Composite score, 7) whether the student received a Pell Grant, and 8) age of the student. Results showed:

- 31% of non-returning students who “stopped out” completed zero to six USA hours earned (85) compared to 8% of non-returning students who transferred (16), 23% of non-returning students who “stopped out” completed 6.5 to 12 USA hours earned (63) compared to 13% of non-returning students who transferred (25), 26% of non-returning students who transferred had 24.5 to 30 USA hours earned (51) compared to 8% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (22), and 18% of non-returning students who transferred had 30.5 or more USA hours earned (34) compared to 5% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (13),
- 52% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” came from Mobile or Baldwin County (152) compared to 24% of non-returning students who transferred (47), 46% of the non-returning students who transferred came from the rest of Alabama (91) compared to 30% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (87), and 16% of the non-returning students who transferred came from the rest of the United States (32) compared to 5% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (14),
- 51% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” lived off campus (149) compared to 30% of non-returning students who transferred (59),
- 40% of non-returning students who transferred had no at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2018 (79) compared to 19% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (55) and 21% of non-returning students who “stopped out” had four or more at-risk midterm grades in Fall 2018 (60) compared to 10% of non-returning students who transferred (20),
- 22% of non-returning students who “stopped out” obtained a high school GPA of 3.0 or lower (63) compared to 12% of non-returning students who transferred (23) and 52% of the non-returning students who transferred obtained a high school GPA of 3.51 or higher (102) compared to 35% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (102),
- 26% of non-returning students who “stopped out” received an ACT Composite score of 20 or 21 (69) compared to 14% of non-returning students who transferred (25),
- 55% of the non-returning students who “stopped out” received a Pell Grant (160) compared to 44% of non-returning students who transferred (88), and
- 91% of the non-returning students who transferred were 18 years old (181) compared to 81% of non-returning students who “stopped out” (236).

Implications

Results showed a large percentage based differential between students who “stopped out” with a USA GPA of 2.0 or lower at the end of Summer 2019 (45%) and students who completed zero to six USA hours earned at the end of Summer 2019 (23%) compared to non-returning students who transferred. These students may have benefited from programs such as intrusive advising and peer mentoring to improve their likelihood of persistence at USA or to prepare them to transfer to another institution. While the preference is to encourage USA freshmen students to continue and persist at USA, a student who successfully transfers to another institution could also be considered a secondary measure of success compared to a complete “stop out” from higher education.

The findings also showed initial indicators known prior to Fall 2018 to monitor in order to identify students at greater risk to “stop out” instead of transferring to another institution included local students from Mobile or Baldwin County (28%), lived off campus (21%), received an ACT Composite score of 20 or 21 (12%), received a Pell Grant (11%), and obtained a high school GPA

of 3.0 or lower (10%). Students with these characteristics were less likely to transfer to another institution and should be targeted early with interventions to help them persist and return to USA.
